New funding model for supported housing

Supported housing helps hundreds of thousands of the most vulnerable people in the country to live independently or to turn their lives around

What is supported housing?

- Supported housing is housing provided alongside care, support or supervision.
- It is a <u>diverse sector</u>
- Around <u>716,000 people live in around 651,500 supported housing units</u> in Great Britain.
- The net fiscal benefit is estimated at £3.5 billion per year.



A new funding model is required to support growing demand, a desire for greater oversight and to be compatible with wider welfare reforms

What is the case for change?

To secure supply now and in the future

To strengthen focus on outcomes, oversight and cost control

To ensure funding works with the modernised welfare system



We have been working closely with supported housing commissioners, providers and representatives of tenants to develop a solution

Working with the sector to develop a solution

- At <u>Autumn Statement</u> 2015 we announced our intention to apply the <u>Local</u> <u>Housing Allowance</u> rates to the social rented sector, including supported housing.
- Last year we also committed to <u>reforming the funding of housing costs</u> for supported housing.
- What has been clear is that a one-sized fits all approach will not work
- We have also put back commencement from April 2019 to April 2020.



Recognising the diversity of the sector, we are introducing different funding models for different parts of the supported housing sector


What was our October 31 announcement?


Policy Statement and two consultations:


- 1. <u>Introducing a 'Sheltered Rent' from April 2020</u> a type of social rent that will keep funding for sheltered and extra care homes in the welfare system and bring in proportionate cost controls (for sheltered and extra care housing).
- Funding for other long-term supported housing remaining in the welfare system

 with a commitment to the sector to work to deliver improved cost control,
 quality and outcomes (e.g. such as housing for those living with a disability, or
 those with mental ill health).
- 3. <u>Short-term supported housing grant:</u> short-term accommodation to be funded and commissioned by local authorities though a ring-fenced grant from central government from 2020 (e.g. crisis or transitional accommodation, such as homeless hostels or domestic abuse refuges).

We are also seeking to improve local planning for supported housing and commissioning across service areas. We published a draft National Statement of 5 Expectation, and outlines for local level strategic planning.









As well as overarching expectations, we set out specific expectations for different parts of the supported housing sector

Expectations tailored to different parts of the sector

- For sheltered and extra care supported housing we want to see local planning, commissioning and services that:
 - 1. Plan and facilitate new supply;
 - 2. Provide support which keeps people independent, offers a real alternative to residential care, and enables efficient use of stock; and
 - 3. Provide transparency in reporting against delivery.
- For short-term accommodation we expect to see local planning, commissioning and services that:
 - 1. Enable fair access, even where no local connection has been established;
 - 2. Support individuals to move on to independent accommodation; and
 - 3. Report against spend.
- For long-term supported housing we hope to see local planning, commissioning and services that:
 - 1. Provide support which keeps people independent, offers a real alternative to residential care, and enables efficient use of stock; and
 - 2. Provide transparency in reporting against delivery.



We want to continue to work with and listen to commissioners, providers, tenants and their representatives to develop the details of the new funding models
