


Multi-generational kitchens should be:

- Able to promote independence





What to include in an age and disability-friendly kitchen

- 1. Reduce the need to bend 80 per cent of kitchen falls are caused by bending, so no ovens below worktop level and no hinged doors; go for pull-outs.
- Waterfall edges to worktops reduce the risk of spills that need mopping from the floor or hot liquids burning laps for wheelchair users or legs/feet. Also good for extra grip to steady yourself or hook your stick over.
- 3. See-through doors can help those who struggle to remember where things are.
- 4. Facility to label doors and handles.
- 5. Facility to lock doors.
- 6. Consider colour contrast for those with sight issues. Don't use reflective surface.
- 7. No gas hobs!










































This design 7535mm.
