
## Our approach

## Design concept



#### Design ideas:

- Sight lines visual triggers/familiarity internal and external.
- Living spaces face towards communal gardens with large windows and sun porch.
- Clearly defined pedestrian destinations in the courtyard garden.
- Colour contrasts and triggers e.g. colour render surrounds and numbering.
- Visual memory triggers e.g. individual patio and colours to the back; glazed doors in kitchen cupboards.
- Safety features e.g. lighting and doorbell fitted with camera.
- Courtyard garden raised beds, sensory planting, summer house and potting sheds.
- Adaptable for future aids and adaptations.

## What did we learn?



- Need to bring the design team along e.g. sight lines within the homes.
- Internal consultation support services e.g. gardening; impact on Place Coordinators.
- Challenge interpretation e.g. communal lounge; front and back of properties.
- Stick to principles but be adaptable e.g. independent living.
- Partnership working critical to success to delivering bespoke development.
- Gained critical insight by working with experts and people living with cognitive conditions.
- Understanding housing needs and gaining important knowledge to inform design.
- Simple design ideas can make a big difference transferable ideas.
