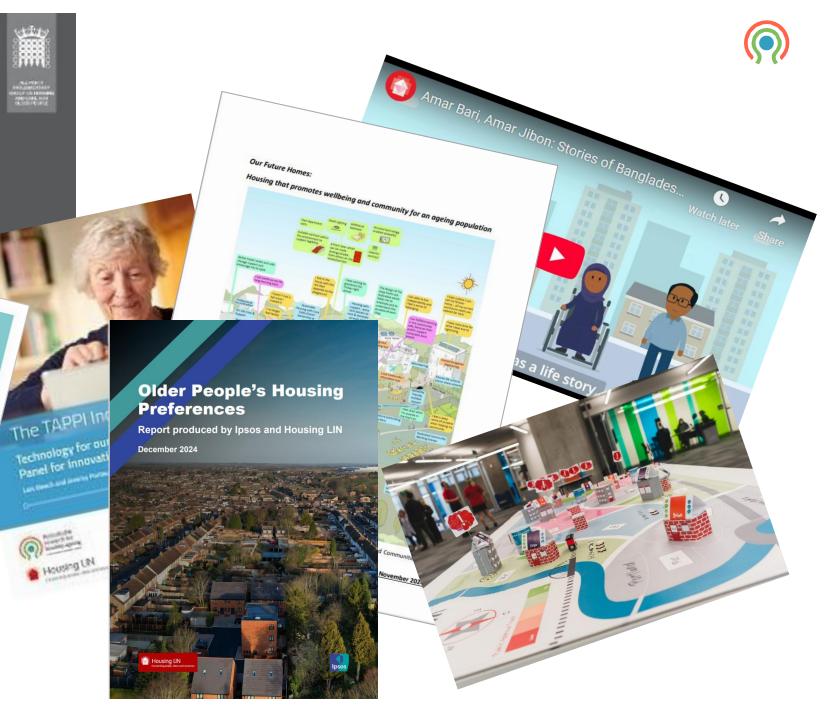

SHAPE Exchange

Three linked pillars:

1. Intelligence: curating and sharing resources

2. Involvement: testing, learning and scaling through the SHAPE Labs

3. Developing new leadership capability: supporting change in leadership thinking



SHAPE Labs



- Currently funding for 3-4 sites (other funders invited)
- Proposals should contribute to the development of transformational approaches to providing wider housing choices for older people, grounded in their needs and preferences
- New or retrofit
- Thought to how housing, health and care can work together in an integrated way
- Each leadership team part of a supported Learning Set.
 Learning to be shared openly.



Examples

- Development of innovatively-designed new homes which are adaptable for a lifetime.
- Scaling well-evidenced alternative modes of living e.g. multigenerational communities or co-housing.
- Homes designed using the HAPPI principles and using the enabling TAPPI principles
- Development and adoption of a local plan which has been developed with the input of local community, plus housing, health and care agencies
- Retrofitting existing housing stock to better meet the changing needs of older residents
- Creating intergenerational or mixed-use housing hubs, blending housing with community assets such as libraries, nurseries, cafes, or health services, to reduce isolation and promote wellbeing



Examples



- Innovative tenure models that improve affordability and flexibility for older people
- Integration of technology-enabled care and smart home design, to support independence, safety, and connectivity for residents, in line with the TAPPI principles
- Coproduction models where older people are involved throughout the design and delivery process
- Embedding housing within place-based prevention strategies, aligned with local population health, ageing, and housing action plans
- Developing culturally specific or inclusive housing options to meet the needs of diverse communities
- Environmental sustainability and net-zero approaches that link ageing in place with wider climate resilience goals (e.g. low-carbon building, Passivhaus, etc.)



Characteristics of suitable locations



For example...

- Demonstrate community-led identification of need
- Ability to demonstrate a culture of co-production at the heart of all service design and delivery and the will to collaborate across health, housing and social care.
- Can demonstrate strong links with the voluntary and community sector and a desire for further integration as part of designing new services (with a culture of 'all partners have an equal place at the table').
- Evidence of active engagement with a wide range of partners.
- Deliberate and thoughtful political connected-ness, for example in City Regions where work in one or two places can be easily and effectively shared with others in the region.
